Black Cultural Center Open House & Grand Opening

The Lyllye Reynolds-Parker Black Cultural Center Open House was held in August (photos below). The Black Cultural Center's architecture concept is based on four interrelated Black concepts; the Veil, the shotgun house type, autonomy and curatorial. While attempting to achieve a unique aesthetic, these concepts also address pragmatic conditions throughout the project. The "shotgun" house signifies a Black building type in the form of a domestic/institutional hybrid. A cultural artifact found primarily in the Southern United States, the type is well-suited for the BCC site—a shifting territory between residential and university buildings and the strong north/south configuration of the site. By its nature, the shotgun type is adaptable. Here expressed in the Black Cultural Center, its simple domestic roof forms split and invert, producing a "double" silhouette. Depending on a pedestrian's approach, the building reflects surrounding domestic and/or institutional structures.

The Grand Opening will be on Saturday, October 12th, 2019 from 11:30AM—3PM, and is by registration only. If you want to attend, please fill out the registration form found below:

Environmental Leaders Annual Orientation Trips

Students from the Environmental Leaders Academic Residential Community (ARC), which is managed by the Office of Sustainability, went on their annual orientation trips the week before school started. Nearly 50 incoming students participated in one of five concurrent trips: Pedal Project, which focuses on biking and sustainable transportation; Project Tomato, which focuses on local food and agriculture; Coast Conscious, which focuses on Oregon's coastal ecology; H2Oregon – McKenzie River Trail, a light back-packing trip that traces the source of Eugene's water; and H2Oregon – Waldo Lake, a new trip where students backpack around Waldo and other area lakes and learn about land management from wildfires to trail maintenance to Search and Rescue and recreation. For the rest of the year, this group of students will live together in Justice Bean Hall and take classes together in Environmental Studies along with programming and education from the Office of Sustainability.
