

RIBBON CUTTING AT BEAN HALL

On October 8th, University Housing invited the campus community to a ribbon cutting ceremony, celebrating the official reopening of Bean Hall, named after Justice Robert Sharp Bean, 16th Chief Justice of the Oregon Supreme Court. The hall was designed by DeNorval Unthank Jr., the first African American student to earn an architecture degree at UO. The ribbon cutting marked the conclusion of the three year renovation. Originally built in 1960, the complete renovation cost \$47 million. The hall now holds 716 beds, has two community kitchens and space dedicated to tutoring sessions, academic advising and office hours for faculty fellows. The project also included significant seismic upgrades. **George Bleekman** was the Owner's Rep for this project and commented that the positive response from the residents has been incredible. While always known for its sense of community, the additions linking east and west, along with the open floor plan have further strengthened community. It has become a residence hall that the students "want" to live in versus "have" to live in. He also noted that it was very exciting to be part of a project that preserved and upgraded a nicely executed mid-century modern residence hall, providing a vibrant living learning environment for generations to come.

Former Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS), Andrew Marcus invited Willie and Donald Tykeson, knowing their passion for supporting students and liberal arts education, to donate the lead gift for the building that now bears their names. Located in the heart of campus, Tykeson Hall is the home to the UO's new approach to academic and career advising. The building also gives students a place to develop a plan for success at UO and beyond. Pictured below, Bruce Blonigen, Dean of CAS announced the countdown to the ribbon cutting on October 25th. Former Dean, Andrew Marcus, the Tykeson's three children, President Schill, Doneka Scott, Vice Provost for UESS, and Kevin Marbury, VP of Student Life, were among those cutting the ribbon.



GRAND OPENING OF THE LYLLYE REYNOLDS-PARKER BLACK CULTURAL CENTER

Thanks to grassroots support and a generous gift from Dave and Nancy Petrone, the Black Community Center opened its doors on October 12th. The center is named for Lyllye Reynolds-Parker, a civil rights activist and UO alumna, who touched countless lives of UO students in her career as an academic advisor. Ms. Parker was born in Eugene. She didn't attend college until age 40, and then, as a single mother, became an inspiration to countless students and a champion of Black student empowerment and community. The Center opens one year to the day after breaking ground.

"Busting his buttons"

His attorney thinks George Weyrens must be up in heaven "busting his buttons" over the idea that his life savings one day will help young people get a college degree.

Weyrens, who was developmentally disabled, went to the UO not as a student but for his job as a janitor. He was gentle and kind—but so reclusive he had no social life and so frugal he wore his uniform at home and ate all meals with his one plate, fork, spoon, and knife.

"Nobody knew George Weyrens," says Marc Perrin '78, J.D. '81, of Eugene. "They might've seen him in the back of Emerald Hall, pushing dust bunnies." Weyrens retired in 1987 and died in 2001, not long after Perrin convinced him to make a will so his money wouldn't simply go to the state, because Weyrens had no close living relatives. He didn't designate a beneficiary for the bulk of his estate, but he entrusted Perrin with that responsibility.

Perrin donated \$22,000 from Weyrens and added \$3,000 of his own money to meet the minimum requirement to endow the George Weyrens Scholarship Fund in 2004, during Campaign Oregon.

Whenever possible, the scholarship will be awarded to children of UO Facilities Services employees or to specialneeds students. "I know George, in his own way, would have been very proud."
