## **TENTS ON CAMPUS**

COVID-19 has required many changes to buildings, classrooms, and our campus environment to meet social distancing requirements and COVID protocols. Prior to the resumption of fall term, CPFM led an effort to coordinate the installation of tents in a number of campus locations to provide outdoor, covered spaces for dining, informal learning, and a place for students, faculty, and staff to sit when not needing to be in a classroom or building. A number of groups within CPFM contributed to the effort and worked as a team to ensure successful tent installations across campus. Initial site assessments were performed by **Aaron Olsen** in Campus Planning to identify locations where tents could be considered as well as communicating with other groups across campus that were exploring tent options.

Tents have been installed at the EMU to expand dining, the School of Music to support outdoor music practice, the University Health Center, near Allen Hall, between Anstett and Fenton Halls, and a large tent located in the Women's Memorial Quad. After the initial planning, Design and Construction Owner's Representative **Luke Helm** led the effort to coordinate all the installations across campus. The expertise of many CPFM staff contributed to the project. For example, D/C's staff architect, **David Cates** coordinated city code and permit requirements, Facilities Services staff provided tables and chairs, provided power for lights. The Grounds Crew will play an important role in rejuvenating the landscape that will be impacted when the tents are removed. The Zero Waste team has provided waste receptacles and is committed to helping keep these areas clean.

Overall this is a great example of how CPFM works collaboratively, is committed to supporting student success, and has shown adaptability towards responding to campus needs during these COVID-19 times.



## **QUESTIONS FOR MIKE**

**Question**: How will layoffs on campus impact CPFM? Specifically those who may have bumping rights according to the CBA?

**Answer**: That is a great question that does not have an easy or simple answer. Each situation is unique and no two layoff situations are alike. Keep in mind that in the event of an employee being laid off in another unit, it does not necessarily mean that employee will bump one of our CPFM employees.

The bumping process is covered in our Collective Bargaining Agreement under Article 44: Layoff, Section 3(2). It is not automatically triggered – it must be requested by the laid off employee. There must also be a match between the laid off employee's abilities and the requirements of the position being requested by them. If there is not an alignment of abilities, then there is no bump.

The University of Oregon, located in Eugene, OR, has been utilizing Klamath Hall since the mid-1960s—but obviously science and technology is vastly different today than it was nearly 60 years ago. The outside of the building would remain intact, while the inside would be updated to accommodate modern research and equipment.


